After moving to Burundi to volunteer with a remote hospital, he was recruited to join the NGO, Gardens for Health International in Rwanda, where he directed a health educational program that is offered alongside agricultural training and inputs to address malnutrition. With the support of local mothers, he developed curricula to train clinicians, community health workers and families experiencing malnutrition. Knowing that a broader skillset would allow him to better serve his communities, he continued training and became an FNP. Shortly after graduating he was recruited by FAME Medical in Tanzania to work as the clinical education coordinator and strengthened the visiting clinician program and started a continuing education program led by the Tanzanian team. As a certified hospice and palliative care nurse practitioner, he also started a palliative care program at FAME Medical and works in palliative care/hospice as his US-based clinical practice. His doctoral work focuses on end-of-life practices and perspectives around the world through a lens of neurodecolonization and healing from intergenerational trauma. His experience as a family nurse practitioner, his global and domestic views of health systems, leadership, clinician education, program development, research, and clinical practice along with his

global experience span over a decade and position him well to lead us into the future of global health.

Eileen T. Lake, PhD, RN, FAAN is the Edith Clemmer Steinbright Professor in Gerontology and Professor of nursing and sociology at the University of Pennsylvania. A nurse and a sociologist, I am an international leader in the theory and methods of nursing systems research. Over three decades, I have studied hospitals as complex organizations and focused on measuring elements of the nurse work environment and nurse staffing and analyzing their relationship to safety and quality of care and patient outcomes. I developed and oversee the National Quality Forum-endorsed Practice Environment Scale of the Nursing Work Index, a survey measure. Translated into 23 languages, this instrument assesses the presence of features in the work environment that support professional nursing practice and has generated global evidence showing care settings that capitalize on nurses' education and skills—by providing competent and supportive managers, expecting physicians to treat nurses as partners in care, providing sufficient staff and resources, and encouraging nurse input on decisions—achieve higher quality outcomes. Most of my work over the past 15 years has focused on linking nursing system factors such as staffing and the work environment to outcomes of very low birth weight infant outcomes in the neonatal intensive care unit. I have begun to explore how nursing factors influence obstetric outcomes and outcomes for newborns with neonatal abstinence syndrome, both complex populations in which a registered nurse is the

principal care provider. I recently developed a measure of nurse moral distress specific to COVID-19 nursing care. My research team examined how communication from nurse managers, such as providing staff with information about policies, procedures, and expectations during the pandemic, related to nurses' moral distress and mental health. I am Associate Director of the Center for Health Outcomes and Policy Research. I serve Co-PI of our T32 pre- and post-doctoral training program "Advanced Training in Nursing Outcomes Research," now in its 23rd year. This program enhances the pipeline of nurse scientists and knowledge generation by recruiting BSN to PhD candidates and expediting training to completion in 3 years. I am a Fellow of the American Academy of Nursing. I have shared my research program in South America by giving keynote speeches and consultation in Spanish to nurses in Bogota, Buenos Aires, Santiago, Sao Paulo, and Mexico City.

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Silvina Malvarez
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Silvina M. Malvárez, RN, PhD, DrSC (hon) is a nurse and a poet born in Córdoba, Argentina, graduated from the SON at the National University of Córdoba (1970) also as a Master on Maternal-Child Health (1986) and as Doctor in Health Sciences (2007). She approved four post-graduate programs: two in mental health services and policy (1986), other in higher education of health professionals, and other in health research methodology. She was honored by McMaster University, Canada, with the degree of Doctor in Sciences (2008) and by the Inca University Garcilazo de la Vega, Perú, as a Doctor Honoris Causa (2010). In her early steps (1973), she created and lead the department of nursing at the Neuropsychiatric Hospital of Córdoba, helping to shift asylum care towards humanized nursing and health care. She was a professor of mental health nursing and health research for 30 years (1973-2002) at the School of Nursing of the National University of Cordoba and also acted as a director for 10 years. She worked with health organizations to improve the development of nursing services in Latin America and training health workers in mental health programs. In the '80 and '90, she cooperated with national and provincial governments, training directors, professors and leaders of mental health in Argentina for the transformation of traditional psychiatric hospitals towards community mental health services. In 2002 Dr. Malvarez emigrated to Washington DC and for 11 years was the PAHO / WHO Regional Nurse Advisor, cooperating with countries of the Americas in the expansion and qualification of nursing education and services. Dr. Malvarez created (2006), the International Nursing Networks Initiative and assumed their coordination until to-date, guiding the contribution of 27 thematic networks including most of the countries of the Americas and some of Europe. Likewise, she worked with the Regional Mental Health Program at PAHO in the transformation of traditional psychiatric hospitals. Dr. Malvarez dedicated studies, cooperation and efforts to promote loving, excellence and compassion nursing care and on the defense of human rights at traditional psychiatric hospitals working to change discrimination, exclusion and abandonment of psychiatric traditional care. She received several national and international awards, including the price of *Outstanding Leadership in Health of the Americas* from PAHO (2012). She now teaches at the National University of Córdoba, at the National University of Rosario (Argentina), and at Andrés Bello University of Chile. Nena Peragallo Montano, DrPH, RN, FAAN became the seventh Dean of the School of Nursing at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in January 2017 retiring January 2022. Formerly dean and professor at the University of Miami School of Nursing and Health Studies (2003-2017), she is an internationally recognized nurse scientist specializing in health disparities and culturally competent interventions with minority populations who has devoted her career to improving the health status of minorities and other medically underserved groups. From 2007 to 2015 she served as Director and Principal Investigator of the Center of Excellence for Health Disparities Research: El Centro, the first NIH P60 center grant awarded to a school of nursing. Peragallo Montano was Co-Principal Investigator of El Centro, from 2015 to 2017. Dr. Peragallo Montano's policy and leadership roles include service on the NIH National Advisory Council for Nursing Research and the National Program Board for the National Clinician Scholars Program, past service on the NIH/NIMHD Advisory Council and co-Chairmanship of the Bipartisan Policy Center's Health Project Workforce Committee. She was selected by *Hispanic Business* as one of the 100 Most Influential Leaders of 2012. She has received numerous honors and awards including a Doctor Honoris Causa from Universidad Inca Garcilaso De La Vega in Lima, Peru, a *Miembro Ilustre* of the Faculty of Medicine at Pontificia Universidad Católica de Chile, an inductee of the International Nurse Researcher Hall of Fame.

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Lynda Wilson, RN, PhD was a Professor at the University of Alabama at Birmingham (UAB) from 1997 until her retirement in November 2015. Following her retirement, she was named a Professor Emerita at UAB. While at UAB Dr. Wilson served as Associate Dean for Graduate Studies (1997-2002), Deputy Director of the Pan American Health Organization/World Health Organization PAHO/WHO Collaborating Center on International Nursing (2002-2015), and Assistant Dean for International Affairs (2008-2014). She also served on the faculty at the University of Alabama Capstone College of Nursing in Tuscaloosa (1986-1997), and the University of Tennessee Knoxville (1978-1985). She has held clinical nursing positions in pediatric nursing, adolescent psychiatry, adult medical-surgical nursing, and public health. She has a BSN from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, an MSN in maternal-child nursing (where she was also prepared as a pediatric nurse practitioner) from the University of Delaware, and a PhD from the University of Tennessee. At the University of Tennessee in Knoxville she helped to establish and then coordinated the first pediatric nurse practitioner program at that school of nursing. At the University of Alabama Capstone College of Nursing in Tuscaloosa she served as the Director of Nursing Research and subsequently held a part-time position as the Assistant Vice President for Academic Affairs.

Dr. Wilson has a long-standing interest in global health and international nursing. She is fluent in Spanish and has led numerous study-abroad courses to Guatemala. In addition, she has been involved with a number of health and development projects in Guatemala and with the Latino community in Alabama. She served as Fulbright Scholar and Specialist in Chile, Zambia, and Malawi. She has consulted on nursing education programs in Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Honduras, Jamaica, Malawi, and Zambia. Her earlier research focused on promoting positive parent-infant relationships, and on developing and evaluating tactile interventions to reduce stress for hospitalized premature infants. Her more recent research has focused on health needs of Latino immigrant families; the development, implementation and evaluation of the first HIV Nurse Practitioner program in Zambia; and identification of global health competencies. From 2009-2012 she received funding from the National Institutes of Health to develop, implement, and evaluate four distance education courses for 166 study coordinators at international sites in 45 different countries. She has received funding for her research and educational projects from the National Institutes of Health, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Division of Nursing, Sigma Theta Tau, International, the March of Dimes, the U.S. Department of State, among others.

From 2013-2016, Dr. Wilson served as Chair of the Subcommittee to Identify Interprofessional Global Health Competencies of the Consortium of Universities for Global Health (CUGH). She is currently serving on a panel to identify Planetary Health Competencies convened by the Harvard University Planetary Health Alliance.

In 2016 Dr. Wilson led the establishment of a Refugee Interest Group for the Justice Committee of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Birmingham. This group has incorporated members from many different faith-based and community organizations. In October, 2019 the group was incorporated as a 501C3 charitable organization named the [Alabama Interfaith Refugee Partnership](#). Dr. Wilson served as the President of this organization from 2019-2022 and currently serves as the Executive Director.

Dr. Wilson is married to Dr. Craig Wilson, UAB Professor Emerita, and Former Director of the UAB Sparkman Center for Global Health. She has 2 children, 2 step-children, and 7 grandchildren. Since her retirement, she has enjoyed spending time with her grandchildren, learning American Sign Language, and leading the establishment of the Alabama Interfaith Refugee Partnership.
