Terri E. Weaver
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Terri E. Weaver, PhD, RN, FAAN is Professor and Dean of the University of Illinois at Chicago (UIC), College of Nursing. She serves as Co-Director of the CC. Dr. Weaver is recognized nationally and internationally for her research on the effect of daytime sleepiness on daily behaviors and assessment of treatment outcomes. Her program of research centers on treatment adherence, analysis of treatment efficacy for obstructive sleep apnea, and mechanisms and outcomes of daytime sleepiness. She has expertise in issues related to functional status/quality of life, treatment adherence, instrument development, and randomized clinical trials. Dr. Weaver has produced two notable disease-specific functional status measures, one for chronic pulmonary disorders and the other for sleep disorders. The psychometrically robust Pulmonary Functional Status Scale has been used

worldwide in pulmonary rehabilitation programs to assess functional status in chronic obstructive pulmonary disease. The Functional Outcomes of Sleep Questionnaire, has become the gold standard for the evaluation of the impact of impact of treatments for sleep disorders to improve quality of life, has been translated into 51 languages and been used internationally in clinical trials. Dr. Weaver also developed the Self-Efficacy Measure for Sleep Apnea, that measures patient’s perception of risk for obstructive sleep apnea, outcomes associated with continuous position airway pressure (CPAP) use, and self-efficacy to apply this commonly prescribed treatment. Dr. Weaver has completed the first and largest multisite randomized clinical trial evaluating the effectiveness of nasal continuous position airway pressure for milder sleep apnea. She has recently concluded a study examining mechanisms of daytime in untreated obstructive sleep apnea patients.
